

Model United Nations Conference (MUN) at Haileybury

Haileybury Turnford students attended the Haileybury's Model United Nations Conference this weekend.

We were proudly representing Kuwait, Tanzania and Malaysia, working with students from across the UK, USA, Lebanon, Holland, France and many more.

Thank you to our sponsor, Haileybury for our invite to this prestigious conference for schools from around the world.

For those who don't know, MUN stands for Model United Nations, in which students from across the country (and sometimes the world) must take on the role of a delegate representing a member state of the real United Nations. Of course, these states are always randomised, and this year, we put ourselves in the shoes of Tanzania, Kuwait and Malaysia. Consequently, students are divided into committees showcasing different presentday issues revolving around topics such as disarmament, human rights and finance. It is then up to the students to solve the problems through heated debates in which participants must adopt their respective countries' views and not their own, enforcing them to take a different approach from their usual debating style.

The MUN at Haileybury lasts three days and takes place annually, welcoming students of all skill levels to experience proper parliamentary procedure and hone their critical thinking. Unlike most events created for the purpose of

enjoyment, the quality of MUN morphs depending on how much you speak and research. It's true that some people don't even speak at all and have fun regardless, but after attending the conference three times, I can safely say that these people are missing out – anyone can make a point just as long as they're confident enough. You're expected to research the topics for debate beforehand, and while it isn't compulsory, I would recommend this to any newcomer who wishes to dominate the stage. Despite this, I'm not saying that the process of MUN is hard to learn, in fact, this year's newcomers seemed to learn more by taking part rather than letting people explain everything; this is what makes this event so commendable, and I hope that those who wish to give it a try next year will think the same.

At the very least these women behind me symbolise what can happen if we battle against a society, and do not leave quietly, disguised behind a gaze, shoved to the back, prisoner of the home, violated, beaten, worn-down, tired — these women are the best the world has to offer, and they have so much more to give... if only we'd let them.

The greatest gift granted to the women behind me and those sat in front of me.... is that you are powerful in your every detail.

Revision

When a student is revising at home, you should expect to see some of the following strategies being implemented:

- Listening and Reading Exercises
- Using Revision Guides
- · Creating and using Flashcards
- Using Post-it notes and displaying where they can be seen every day
- Using revision apps on mobile phones (e.g. Tassomai, PiXL)
- Using revision websites and tests (GCSE Bitesize, Youtube videos, Exam board websites)

On Friday 23rd March students in Year 8 were invited to an Art and Photography workshop in the Main School Hall. Students were given the opportunity to explore new techniques and processes that are experienced in GCSE Fine Art and Photography. Students handled the tasks really well and were proud to take their work home with them.



Combined Cadet Force (CCF) at Haileybury

On Monday and Tuesday last week we went to Haileybury to do the first 24 hour deployment of the year, where Sophie and I helped teach the Year 10s field craft skills. They learnt how to cook, sleep, protect a harbour area, and gather information on the enemy and also how to defeat an enemy force. Sophie and I are both Sergeants in the CCF (we are both 2nd in command) and played the enemy on Tuesday afternoon, being defeated 4 times by the 4 sections of cadets who had be trained over the weekend for that moment.

On Monday the cadets had two lessons in the morning and two in the afternoon, before they set out to create their harbour area. They learnt how to use the equipment they were given to cook in the field and they even got a taste of the food they would be eating. The expressions on their faces were mixed when tasting the ration pack food. They also learnt different ways of setting up their basha, which is a simple sheet that would cover them for the night. This led to extreme shock with the thought of sleeping on the floor! The next lesson they had was learning how to patrol in all of the different ways to ensure that they knew what they were doing when they went into the field. They learnt how to move in single file, staggered file, extended line, and all around the fence. They used all of these in the two days. The two lessons cadets had in the afternoon were a lesson on RTR, where they would learn how to approach an enemy in extended line in a contact front scenario. And a lesson on sentry positions where they learnt how to protect a harbour area from all angles.



After all of the lessons were completed, everyone was issued with kit for the field. The platoon of cadets was split into three sections with the Year 12s as the section commanders and 2/ic's. We then set out to our harbour area and once we were all set up everyone started to cook their first meal and settle in. Once they had all finished doing their admin, everyone was called together for the first patrol to an observation point to find out details on the enemy. The three sections set out and section 1 and 2 gathered information and returned, however section 3 happened to

set out, get lost, gather no information and return back late, but it was not as easy as it sounded. Once they returned everyone went back to their bashers and sat their quietly until an enemy force had started to attack us and we had to take down our bashers and get ready to leave. Once we finished it was too cold to stay out so we set up our sleeping bags inside on the floor, girls in one room and boys in the other, and everyone tried to get a good sleep.

The next morning we all got ready and cooked our breakfast outside and handed in kit that we did not need anymore. Once we were done we were ready for the day's events. And then we went on a long patrol through lots of mud to a different area in the woods where we go a chance to do a CQB lanes (Close Quarter Battle). This is where two people go down a path and shoot any enemies they see. We all put cam cream on our faces and everyone got one chance to have a go, with five targets and 20 blank rounds - we had to use our rounds carefully. Once we finished we went back and had lunch inside this time and then we all came back and were given rounds for the RTR. Sophie and I, as the enemy, were given a lot of rounds, approximately 300 each and we had to load the magazines and when the cadets came up we were to fire at them from a hidden area and then come out into an open area and continue firing as they approached us and killed us every time. Once we had finished the most exciting part of the weekend we got to do the most tedious thing of the weekend; cleaning the rifles. It's a long process that has to be done accurately which many find boring. We spend a good couple hours cleaning.

It was a good two days where the cadets learnt a lot and got an opportunity of a lifetime. It was fun and challenging at the same time but very enjoyable for all.


